

What Skills Does My Child Require to Move Rooms?

While children are moved around a specific age, there are also some skills that each room works on to help with that transition!



Infant to
Transition Room

- Walking
- Independently drinking out of a cup
- Starting to use utensils during meals
- Starting to communicate (including sign language)
- Sits in a chair



Transition to
Toddler Room

- Mostly uses cups and utensils independently
- Using more verbal communication and relying less on signs (with exception of non-verbal children)
- Properly washes own hands
- Begin to follow rules and routines (clean up, no running, "nice hands", etc)
- Uses appropriate table manners



Toddler to
Pre-School Room

- Able to use their words
- Displaying appropriate fine motor skills
- Proper table manners, including using their utensils
- Potty training; able to pull up their own pants
- Can use scissors to cut
- Know their ABCs, numbers to 10, colours, and shapes
- Can put on their own shoes and jacket

It is important to remember that these signs of readiness are fluid and your child may still be moved to the next room before displaying all of them!
